

2 DAYS BY BIKE AND BOAT ALONG THE LIVENZA RIVER

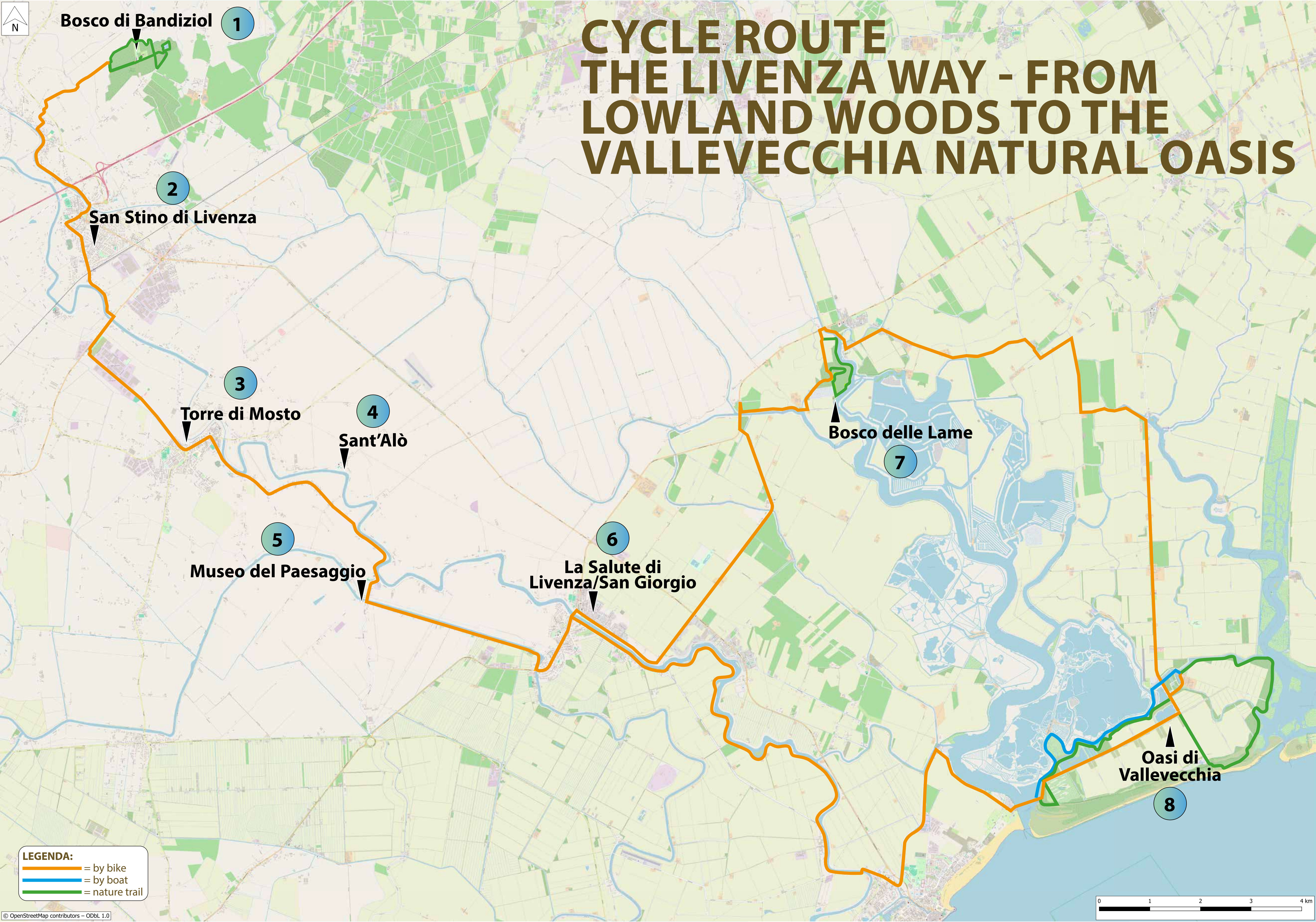
DAY 1 (54 KM BY BIKE + 5 KM WALKING VISITS)

- San Stino di Livenza - Bosco di Bandiziol (by bike, 7 km)
- Visit to Bosco di Bandiziol (on foot, 3 km)
- Bosco di Bandiziol - Torre di Mosto (Landscape Museum) (by bike, 18 km)
- Visit to the Landscape Museum
- Landscape Museum - Bosco delle Lame (by bike, 16 km)
- Visit to Bosco delle Lame (on foot, 2 km)
- Bosco delle Lame - Brussa / Vallevecchia Natural Oasis (by bike, 13 km)

DAY 2 (43 KM BY BIKE + 6 KM BOAT VISIT)

- Vallevecchia Natural Oasis (by bike, 8 km)
- Lagoon visit (by boat, 6 km)
- Porto di Falconera - La Salute di Livenza / San Giorgio di Livenza (by bike, 16 km)
- La Salute di Livenza / San Giorgio di Livenza - San Stino di Livenza (by bike, 19 km)

Note: in Sant’Alò it is possible to rent canoes and boats for “water excursions” along the Livenza River.



Bosco di Bandiziol

A historic lowland wood of about 110 hectares, expanded between 1994 and 1997 with pedunculate oaks, hornbeams, and field maples. In addition to its rich wildlife, it hosts valuable orchid species.

San Stino di Livenza

A lively town not far from the border between Veneto and Friuli, which maintains a strong connection with ancient river traditions.

Torre di Mosto

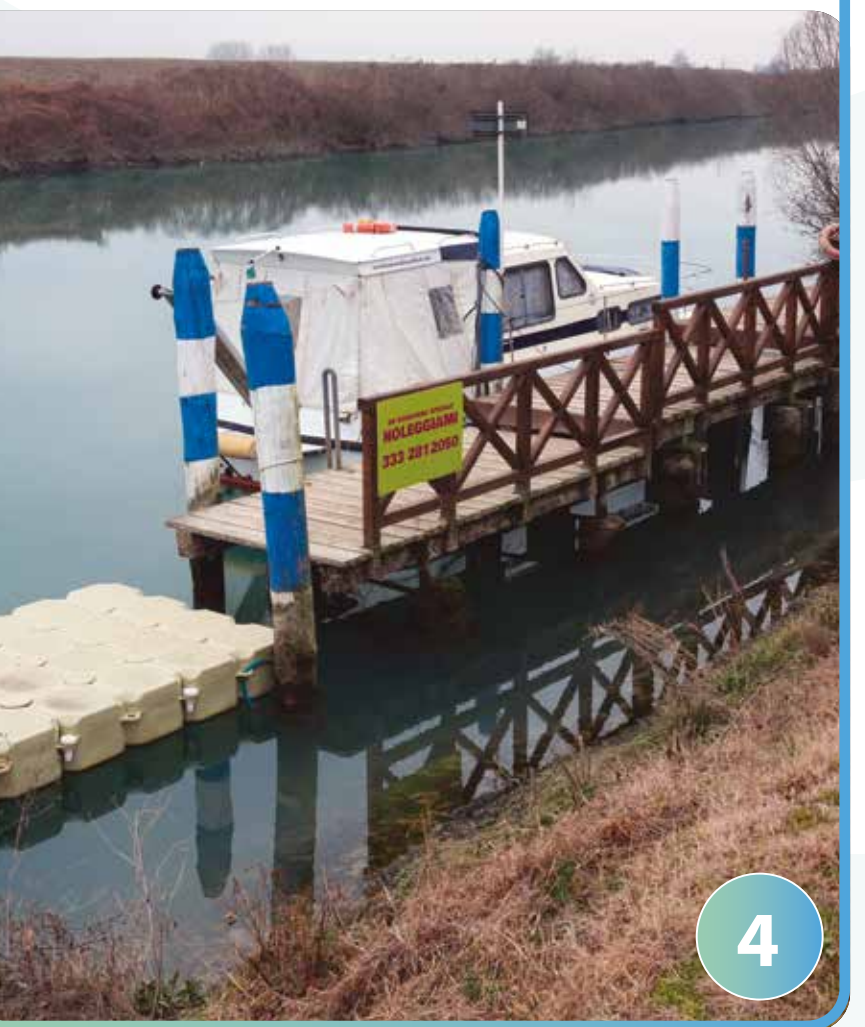
The settlement developed around a medieval watchtower, later acquired by the noble Venetian Da Mosto family, from whom the municipality takes its current name.

Sant’Alò

A small rural hamlet in the municipality of San Stino di Livenza overlooking the course of the Livenza River.

Museo del Paesaggio

An exhibition space dedicated to 20th-century artworks depicting the landscapes of the Venetian lagoons, coasts, and their hinterland. It hosts both permanent collections and temporary exhibitions.

La Salute di Livenza/ San Giorgio di Livenza

Separated by the course of the Livenza River, these two villages are characterized by a strong local identity enhanced by cultural initiatives and murals. valuable orchid species.

Bosco delle Lame

A protected woodland area of about 33 hectares created between 1997 and 1999 with native species such as maples, ash trees, and elms; it hosts numerous bird species.

Oasi di Vallevecchia

With its 900 hectares of dunes, pine forests, and wetlands, the Vallevecchia Natural Oasis is a true treasure chest of biodiversity, an ideal place for birdwatching and nature walks.
